While we're certainly happy with things as they are here at DePaul, we're mindful of the need to keep improving, to build on what we've done in the past to insure an even better future.

That better future depends in part on a stable enrollment, and we've worked hard this admissions season to build a terrific Class of 2023 to join us next fall. Under the able direction of Anne Rotundo, our staff has produced a sizable pool of highly qualified applicants, many of whom have spent a day with us over the past few months, "Spartans for a Day," getting a first-hand experience of life in our classrooms, hallways, and playing fields. These students (a hundred or so of them having joined us for Accepted Students Night this past Monday), are mulling over their options, and we're confident that a goodly number of them will choose us.

We're also working on our curriculum, so that those students who choose us will have the best academic experience possible. To cite just one example, we'll be opening our Academy of Science and Technology this fall, a program with competitive admission, whereby students can emphasize Mathematics and the Sciences in their course selections and earn a special endorsement on their diploma at graduation. Other special curricula, including some in the Humanities, are on the drawing board.

Our physical plant demands our attention as well. We're paying particular attention to our locker rooms, which, we all freely admit, have long needed a lot of work. This affects all of our students, not just interscholastic athletes, and so we must address this as soon as we can. To that end, an ad hoc committee has started to take a hard look at these spaces, with a view toward generating a realistic plan for modernizing them. I'll keep you posted.

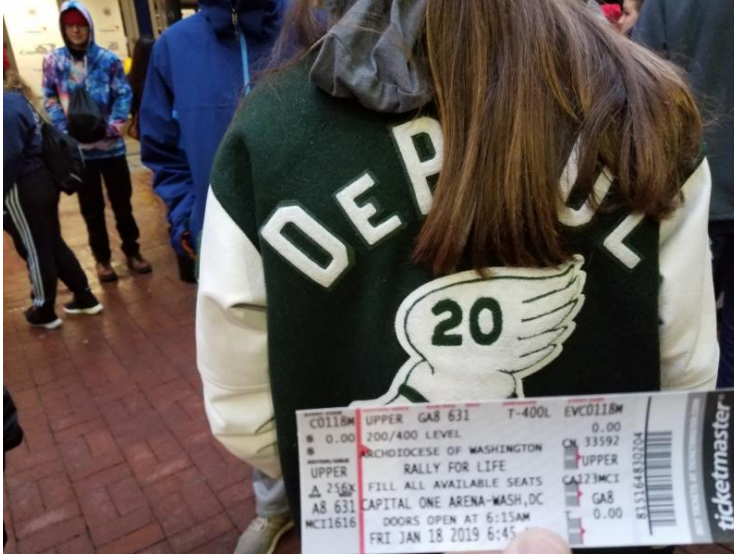

Having worked at DePaul Catholic since the late 1970's, I have had the honor to teach, coach and/or supervise over 8,000 kids, and I have the grey hair and bald spot to prove it.

I have had the good fortune to watch kids grow into young adults while at the same time competing in class and on the athletic field, enhancing their faith, making a few mistakes and learning from them, and dreaming about the future.

Graduation Day (always the first Tuesday in June) brings joy to parents, families, teachers and students. It also brings a little sadness, fear about the future, and some nerves. Every year during the ceremony I hear at least one parent proclaim. ***"I can't***

believe he/she made it”!

One thing I know for sure is that students who graduate from DePaul are prepared for the next step in their lives. Some may not be ready to leave, but they are prepared to leave. Prepared to succeed in college, at work and in the world. Just look at the list of occupations that headline this article.

It is always interesting when I hear, read or have a conversation about how DePaul Catholic is not the same as it used to be. That the school has changed, that the kids are different, etc. I generally hear from, read emails from, or have those conversations with alumni and parents who have not been able to stay connected with DePaul Catholic or who live far away. It's a natural inclination to always look back fondly at your “**Good Old Days**”.

For the students attending DePaul Catholic in 2019, these are their “Good Old Days”.

My general response to the statement, DePaul is not the same, is the following:

Kids have not changed.

- Kids still need to know you care about them.
- They still need to be motivated and encouraged.
- They still need to be challenged.
- They still need to be held accountable.
- They still need role models.
- They still wish for stability at home.
- They still need to be disciplined.
- They still need to have faith.
- They still need to try, fail, get back up, and try again.

What has changed?

Many adults and parents (certainly not all) have changed in how they parent and treat kids.

The following is what many kids are seeing and/or hearing from some adults.

- Instant gratification
- Social promotion in elementary and middle school
- Everybody gets a trophy.
- Social media posts containing personal attacks from a safe distance
- "Don't yell at my kid". (What if every parent said that?)
- The coach is playing favorites.
- The teacher is wrong and the student is right.
- You are singling out my child.
- Reality shows, cable news, adults or talking heads screaming at or interrupting each other. (Trump vs Pelosi as an example)
- Everybody makes the team, wants equal playing time, but wants to win every game.
- Juuling is okay because it's advertised on the radio.
- Gateway drugs (Marijuana) are now okay because the state can tax them at 12%.
- The end justifies the means, ex: steroids in sports.

Kids, in High School, face these challenges every day in the year 2019.

Why is teaching, for me, still meaningful and fulfilling.

Even in the face of all of these challenges, kids still accomplish great things while students at DePaul Catholic and they go on to great things after they graduate. It's fun for me to be a very small part of their success.

Dual Enrollment Program at Caldwell University



We are pleased to announce that Dual Enrollment with Caldwell University registration is open for students currently taking:

English 11 Honors
English 12 Honors
Pre-Calculus Honors

Dual enrollment allows students to register at Caldwell University and receive college credit for a course taken at DePaul Catholic. The cost is \$100/credit (\$300 total) for any one course mentioned above. This is a huge savings. If you register for a course, CU will accept a grade of "B" or better as a college credit. Thus, students have started taking college courses generating a college transcript. This transcript can be sent to the college they decide to attend after graduation. These credits can lessen the number of courses needed to take to graduate from college.

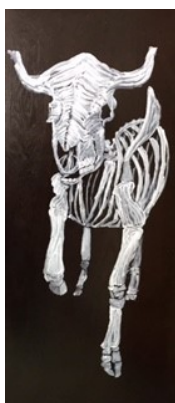

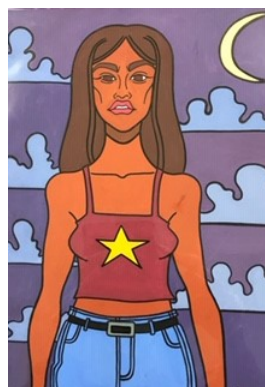

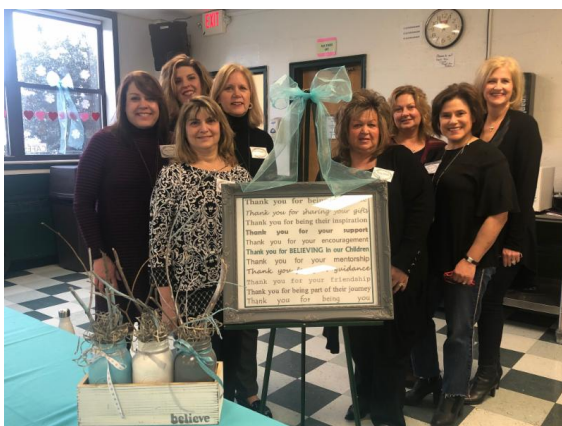
