

Traveling Back In Time In The History Department submitted by <u>Mr. Cook</u>

On March 7, Mr. Cook's AP US History classes stepped back in time and into a simulation of the Ellis Island immigration facility at the turn of the 20th Century. Each student was assigned an immigrant at random; after a few minutes to familiarize themselves with their characters and stories, they lined up to get off the ship and begin the process of registering in the United States. A medical exam was simulated, checking for such things as tuberculosis (some students' character cards indicated that they should cough) and trachoma. Those who passed the medical exam without being sent to quarantine proceeded to a legal screening, where they had to answer questions about their characters (despite the

questions being asked in an invented nonsense language, to simulate the immigrants' unfamiliarity with English). Those who succeeded were sent on to the ferry to begin their new lives; the rest were sent to legal detention. With all of this concluded, the students wrote letters from the perspective of their respective immigrants to explain their experiences and their hopes for life in America.

On March 5, Ms. Brogan's US History I class had a

special visitor: a soldier from the 1st Minnesota Volunteer Infantry of the US Civil War. Mr. Cook trekked upstairs to portray the story of Isaac and Henry Taylor, siblings and teachers who both joined the Union army and fought at Gettysburg. Based on a tour that Mr. Cook used to give at Gettysburg National Military Park, the class followed the story of these two ordinary soldiers at America's most extraordinary battle. Students heard the words of the brothers as their unit suffered the highest casualty rate of any regiment in the Civil War -- twice playing a part in staving off disaster for the Union army. Themes of discussion included the common soldier experience, the suffering of family and communities on the home front, and the creation of the Gettysburg National Cemetery -- where Isaac Taylor is buried today.
