Dear Spartan Community:

A good friend of mine is fond of saying, "Don't Blink" as it relates to how quickly time seems to pass us by and this school year is no exception. We have already held one successful Open House and have another one scheduled on **Sunday**, **October 27**, **2019**. There is an enhanced buzz of excitement related to interest in attending DePaul Catholic High School, and I am happy to share some good news with you related to our academic program.

Last year, I initiated the **Academy of Science and Technology**, a prescribed program of study for students entering the Class of 2023 interested in Engineering or Computer Science. For the Class of 2024, we have added a program of study to concentrate on Medical Science. *I am also pleased to announce the Academy of the Arts and Humanities*. Students will be able to apply for entry into one of three areas of concentration: Arts and Letters; General Humanities; or Law & Government. Each strand includes a four-year Honors curriculum of English and Social Studies, culminating in Advanced Placement courses. In addition, a four-year specialty curriculum in Art, Music, or Law and Government, provides a solid industry-standard based education while allowing ample opportunity for additional electives. Students applying for the Class of 2024 may also apply for one of these specialized courses of study and, upon successful completion, will earn an Academy endorsement on their diploma. Please feel free to contact me, the Admissions Director, or Guidance Office if you should have any questions about our Academy programs.

The Night Things Changed

One Teacher's Opinion

My first year of teaching school was the 1976-77 school year at DePaul. I was 22 years old and I had a head filled with great ideas, or so I thought.

The year was very challenging as I was learning how to transfer to my class what I believed the students needed to learn and master. Some of the students were not very receptive to my lecture about the Lusitania or World War I (OR MOST THINGS!). Can you imagine not being interested in that stuff?

Most of the time, a bad class was my fault. But not all the time.

Some of the students started to be discipline issues in class. With one student in particular it got to the point where I felt it was necessary to call the student's father. It would be the only time, as a teacher, I ever called a parent based on a discipline issue.

The father of the student answered the phone. I explained the situation and the response of the father was "I will take care of this, thank you for calling". The student arrived at school the following day a changed man and went on to become one of the best students in the class. I will always be grateful to the father who helped me by disciplining his son.

Teaching became *real teaching* as I gained experience, and felt that I always had the support of all the parents of the students in my class.

Then.....

One night, I believe sometime in the late 1980s, I think it was a Tuesday, I went to sleep, woke up, went to school and things felt a little bit different. There was a note in my mailbox to call a parent. I did so and went on to be told how I was unfair, had singled out and had embarrassed their child by correcting their behavior in class. *My crime was that I had made the child move their seat*.

It seems the student had gone home and changed the story of what had happened (to save their own skin), and when I gave the parent the true version I was told that I was not being truthful and that I was out to get the student. The quote was "my child never lies to me".

I hung up the phone and realized that life as a teacher had changed. Now, at least for this parent, I was viewed as an adversary rather than a partner in their child's education. Teaching became a bit more challenging after this.

Each year, as more and more parents began thinking like the one mentioned above, I noticed teachers hesitating to discipline children, avoiding communicating with parents and I watched grades begin to inflate. Confrontations rather than cooperation became more common. This was especially true for my friends who taught in public school.

Education, in many schools, became more about keeping the peace than about challenging students to be the best they can be. There became a true divide with parents. There were still plenty of supportive parents, ready to work with teachers to help their child, however the ever more vocal group of parents who viewed their children as victims and teachers as adversaries became a constant issue.

Today, this is what I notice now as I approach my $66^{\mbox{th}}$ birthday.

People still become teachers for all the right reasons.

- · To educate
- · To guide
- To coach
- To set an example

The sad part is, that for some teachers, the perceived lack of support has led them to either lower standards to keep the peace, or to leave the profession. This is true with coaches also, in my opinion.

These people work in both private and public schools.

Teachers leave the profession because:

- They are not permitted to discipline their class.
- They must guarantee that all outcomes, for all students in the class, are the same no matter what the level of ability of the student.
- · Teachers have no control over the social promotion of students not ready to be promoted.

- · Lack of support from parents in monitoring homework and home studying for tests and exams.
- · Politics, especially in public schools.

Teachers stay in the profession when:

- · They view it as a mission.
- · They are not affected, too much, by the negativity that surrounds them.

Finally,

Teaching is still a great profession and my hope for younger teachers is that they go to sleep one night and wake up to find a renewed partnership with parents, both in academics and athletics.

A continued thanks to all the parents who support the educators in their schools.

In my opinion:

Team teaching is not about 2 teachers in a room teaching a subject, it is really about teacher + parent working together.

The result: happy, successful students.
